Diversity

Sagemont students are global citizens. This is represented by the 28 countries from which our students call home. Additionally, with a student body composed of 6% of students from Seminole descent, we are proud to represent a population rich in culture, diverse thoughts, and expressions daily.

Signature Programs

Sagemont students have the opportunity to explore their passions through curricular offerings such as the Sophomore Passion Project, Executive Internships, and the Senior Market Project. Each of these curricular offerings allows Sagemont students to plan, develop, and create projects that focus on real-world applications.

Sagemont is a vibrant community, where global perspectives are key elements of the curriculum through the integration of social justice discussions, writing, and research. Through social justice and anti-bias instruction, students are taught to be aware of bias and injustice, both individual and systemic. Outside of the daily curriculum, social justice teachings are conducted through a weekly advisory forum with a faculty guide.

Week Without Walls has become a tradition at Sagemont and is a week of experiential learning in which our students explore areas of interest and passion, based on Sagemont's Learning Outcomes. Students explore and participate in hands-on practical learning and engage in community service together.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

One half-credit is assigned per class semester and one credit for a full year course. Students generally take six courses per semester and must complete a minimum total of 24 academic credits from 9th-12th grade and 100 hours of community service to receive a diploma. These requirements allow for considerable choice while ensuring a challenging and balanced academic schedule.

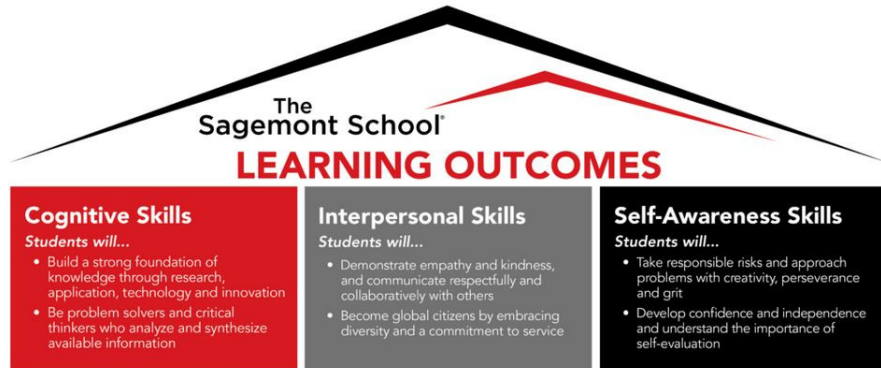

GRADING SCALE

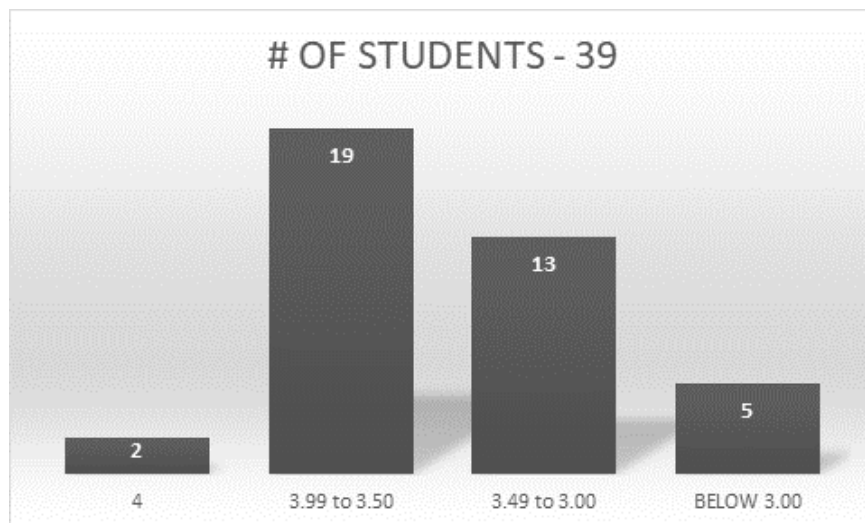

ASSESSMENTS & GRADING

Sagemont does not rank its students. All courses and levels are calculated on a 4.0 scale, this includes Honors and Advanced Placement courses. The Sagemont School coursework incorporates formative and summative assessments. Semester grades are based on summative assessments, which provide measurable evidence of learning. Summative assessments in each course include major end of learning unit tests, projects, or writing pieces.

Standards-based grading practices provide specific clear learning goals for what a student must know and be able to do to master the content of each course.

AP Capstone Diploma Program

AP Capstone is built on the foundation of two AP courses – AP Seminar and AP Research. Students investigate real-world issues from multiple perspectives, gathering and analyzing information from various sources to develop credible and valid evidence-based arguments.

Internships

The Executive Internship Program is an honors elective course that allows students to participate in first-hand professional experiences. Community sponsors involve students in major issues, significant projects, and research related to their future area of study.

Week Without Walls

Week Without Walls takes students outside the "walls" of the school building, where they are engaged in community service and exploration. This annual program for all students includes learning experiences such as growing in an aquaponics system, interning at a software company, learning to fly a plane, exploring horticulture at local farms, and so much more.

The Passion Project

A class for students who have always wanted to build a musical instrument, find innovative ways to solve problems, have questions about a topic that they have wanted to research on their own. The Passion Project is a learner-centered, choice-based research project completed by students over a semester during their sophomore year. With standards rooted in Sagemont's Learning Outcomes, students develop skills in inquiry, communication, and independent learning. Students utilize skills in information literacy, communication, collaboration, thinking, reflection, and transfer. Through the developmental process of self-reflection, goal development, and relationship with an advisor, students create one-of-a-kind research projects that highlight who they are, what they are interested in, and how that informs their passions.

Senior Year

Delivered through the Micro-economic course all seniors work in groups to collaborate and develop a marketplace. Students are tasked with developing a business together. This process includes documentation of all aspects of the business, including a business plan, strategic marketing, understanding supply and demand, profit margins and ultimately starting up a company. A marketplace is established by the senior class and the school community serves as their customers in a weeklong competitive market.
